The Salt Lake County Sheriff's Office Millcreek Precinct provides law enforcement services to approximately 65,359 residents, as well as the people who work, shop, and recreate within the community.



The Millcreek Precinct area is bordered by Salt Lake City on the north, the City of Taylorsville on the west, Murray and Holladay City to the south and Summit County on the east.

The Precinct, is one of five patrol precincts serving the citizens of Salt Lake County. Thirty six patrol deputies provide around the clock service. The precinct is comprised of one division commander, a lieutenant, and five sergeants. The Millcreek Precinct maintains a compliment of 7 detectives, 2 traffic enforcement officers, and one school resource officer. Additionally, the precinct receives support from the office's investigative, civil, and special operations divisions.

Patrol Operations

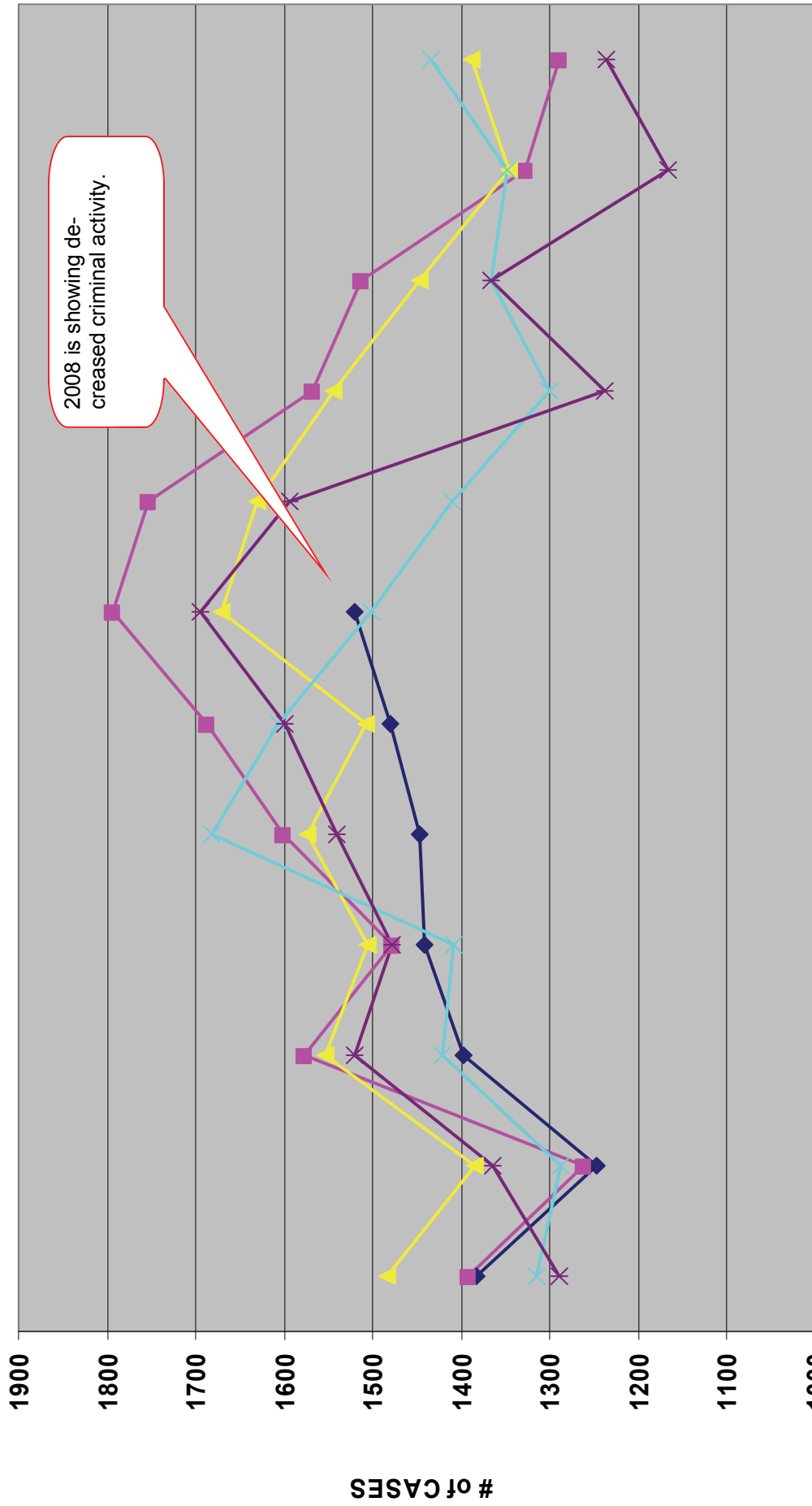
Thirty-six patrol deputies and four sergeants are the heart of our patrol division. Our team enjoys extensive law enforcement experience with an average of 7 years experience. Deputies utilize their years of training and knowledge from previous assignments, to help solve crimes, complete traffic investigations, and run a highly successful Community Oriented Policing program. Our functional diversity is a tremendous benefit to the varying communities we interact and serve.

The Millcreek Precinct prides themselves in providing the types of services this unique community desires. Surveys conducted continually rank traffic problems, speeding, drugs/alcohol and crime reduction as the priority concerns of this community. We focused intently on the prevention of traffic accidents and congestion, while aggressively enforcing speed compliance.

This was accomplished by our patrol officers and a committed traffic enforcement team. These experienced deputies place educational “speed trailers” near trouble zones. These trailers use radar to remind drivers of their speeds, and work as an excellent speed-reducing tool, keeping our streets, pedestrians, and other drivers’ safe. The traffic enforcement team also target traffic issues, such as school zone safety, red-light violations, aggressive drivers, and speed compliance.

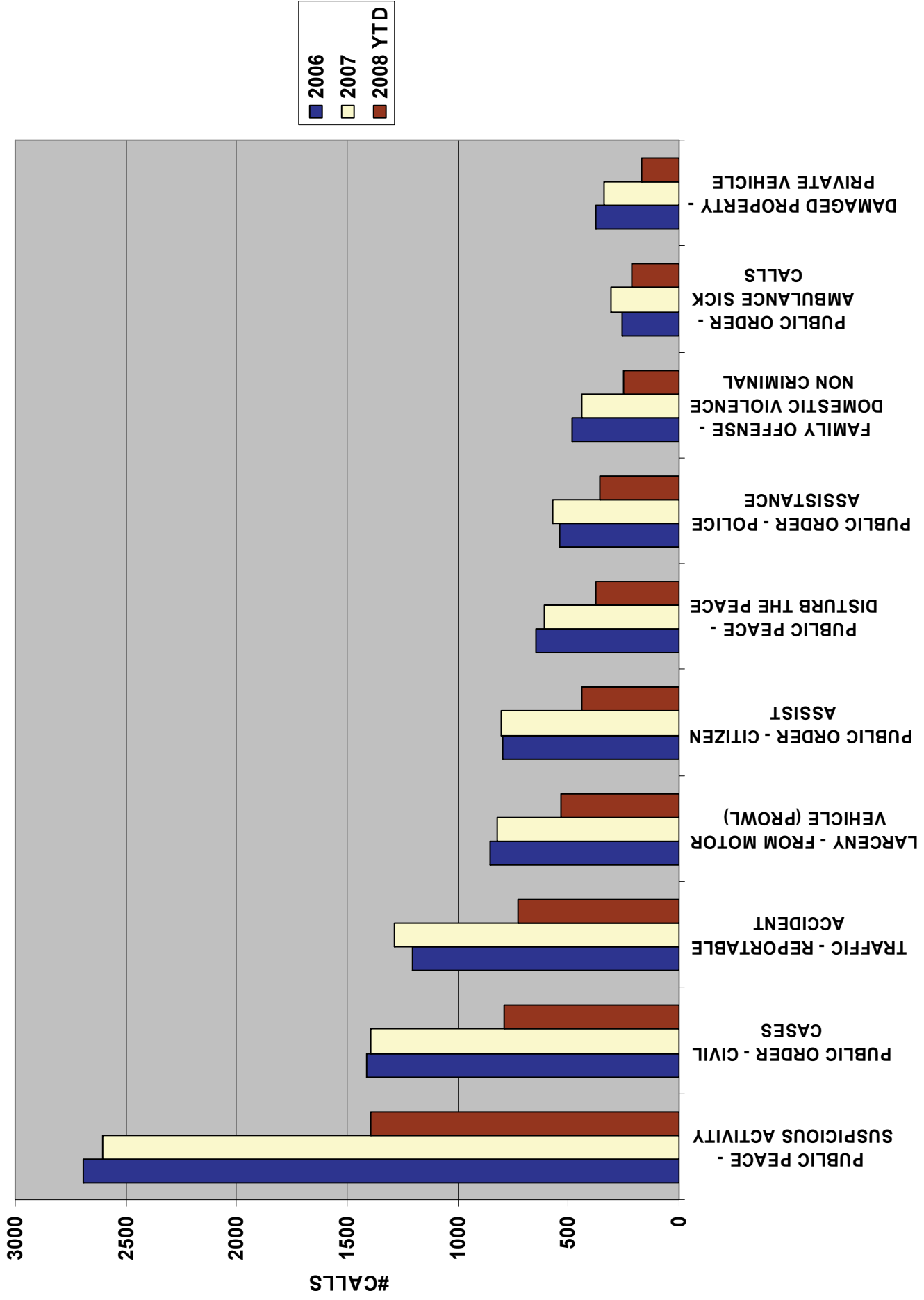
The Wasatch District deputies engaged in pro-active patrol techniques that resulted in numerous arrests of suspects involved in continuous criminal activities. For example, working with our district detectives, they developed crime patterns of vehicle and residential burglars to solve crimes and put suspects in jail. Numerous drug investigations have resulted in arrests, thereby reducing the amount of illegal drugs in the Millcreek Township.

MILLCREEK TOWNSHIP Crime Trend 2004 - 2008

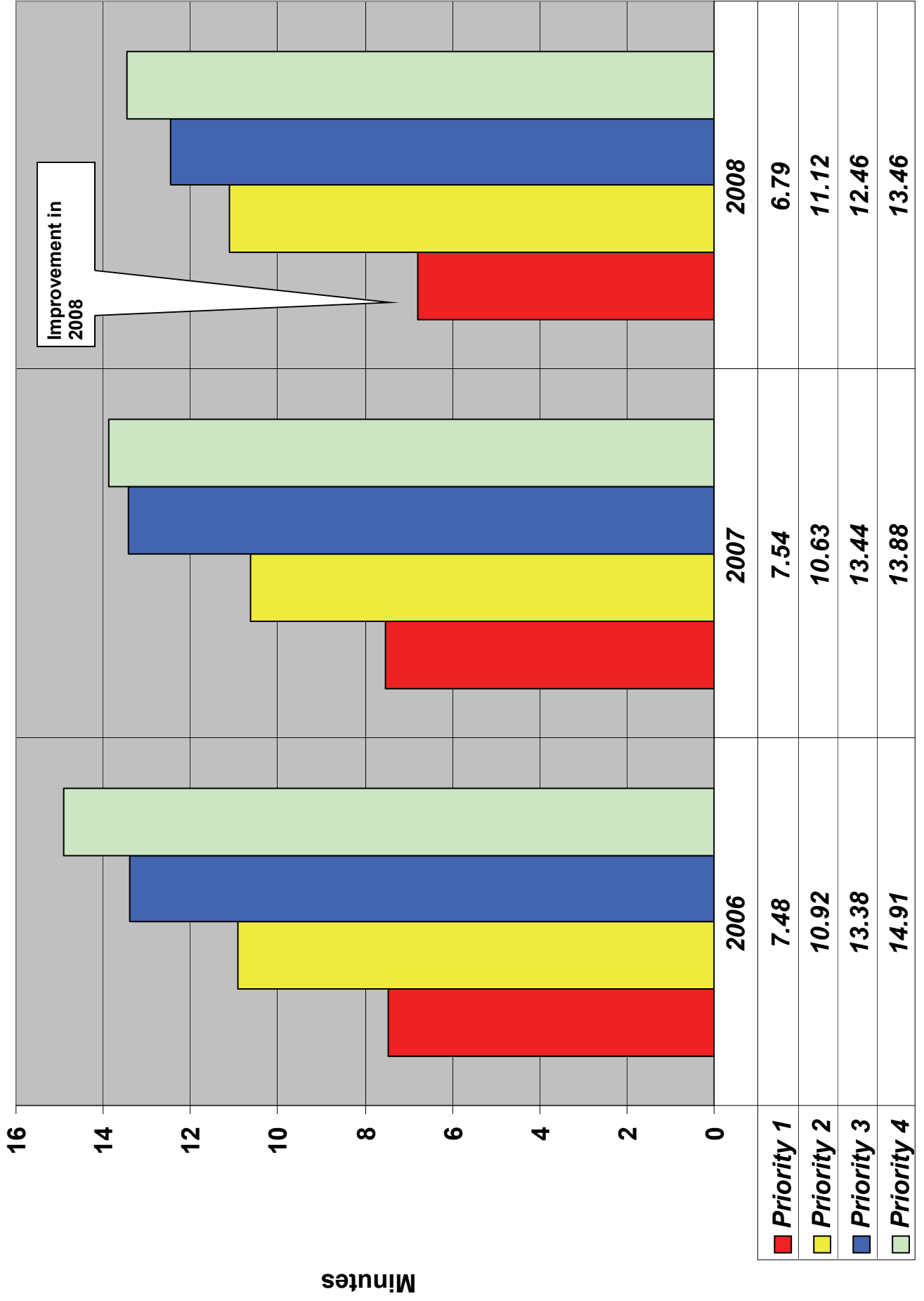

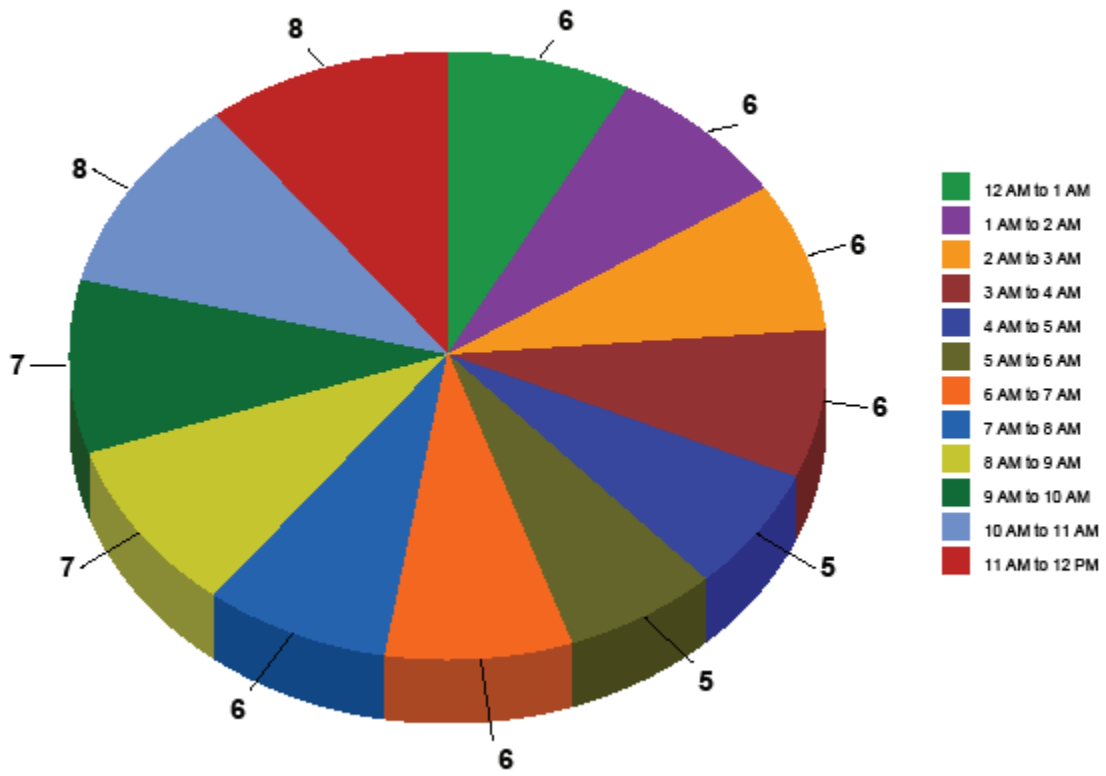

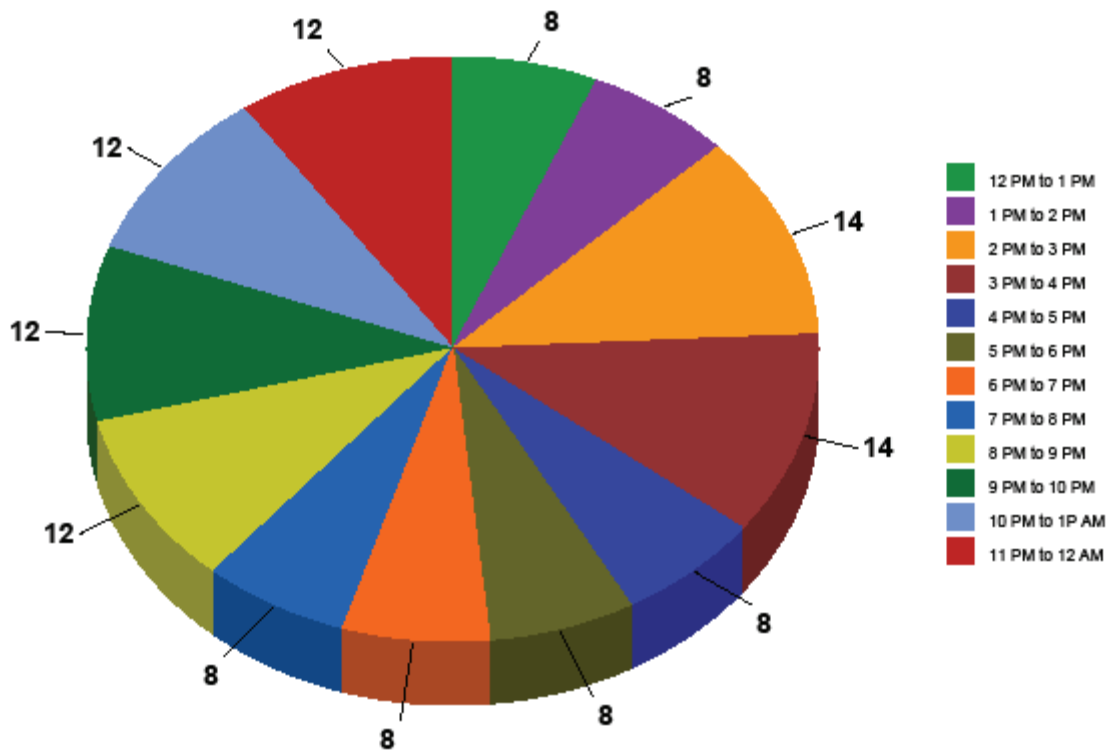

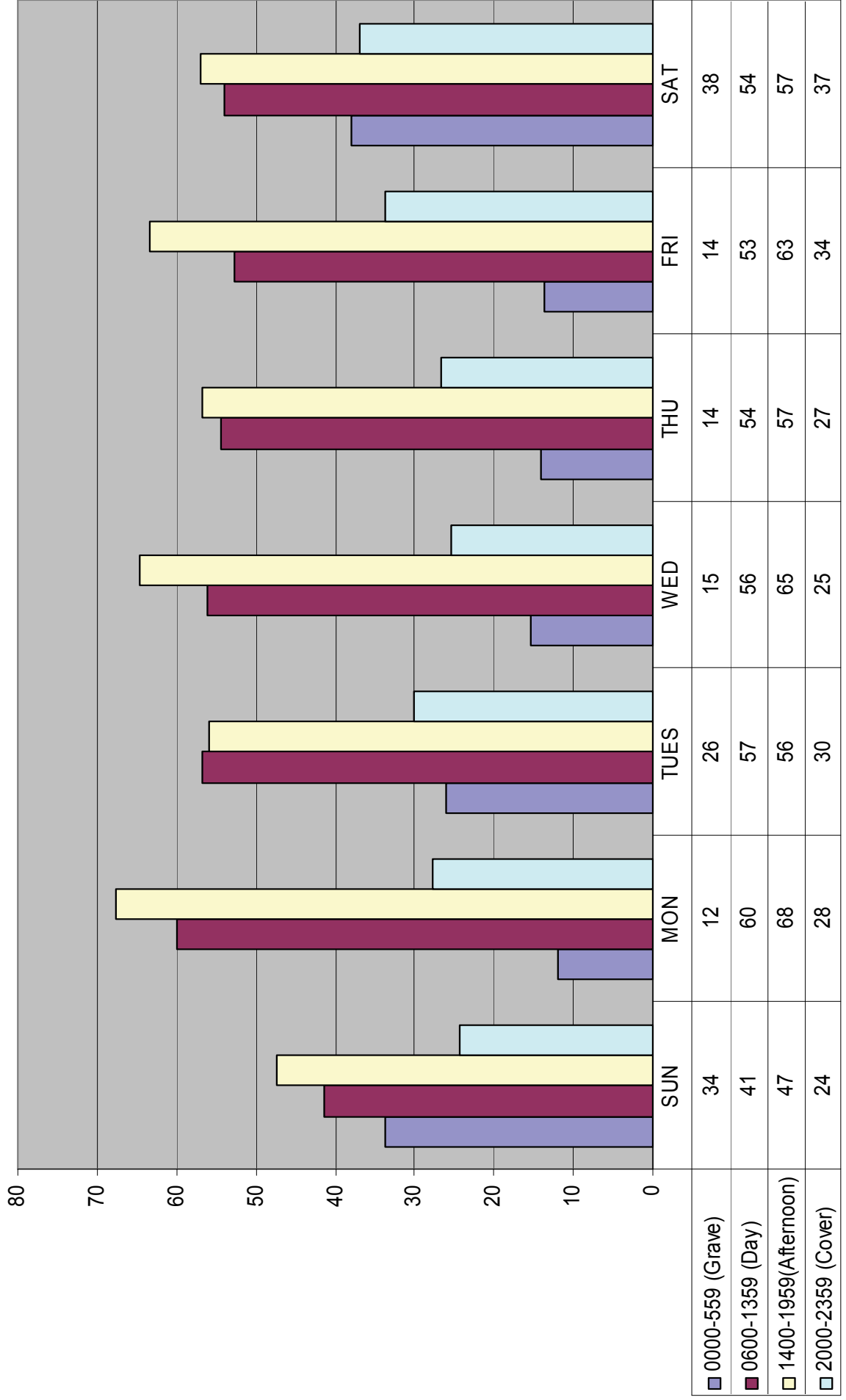
Millcreek Patrol Coverage 12 AM to 12 PM



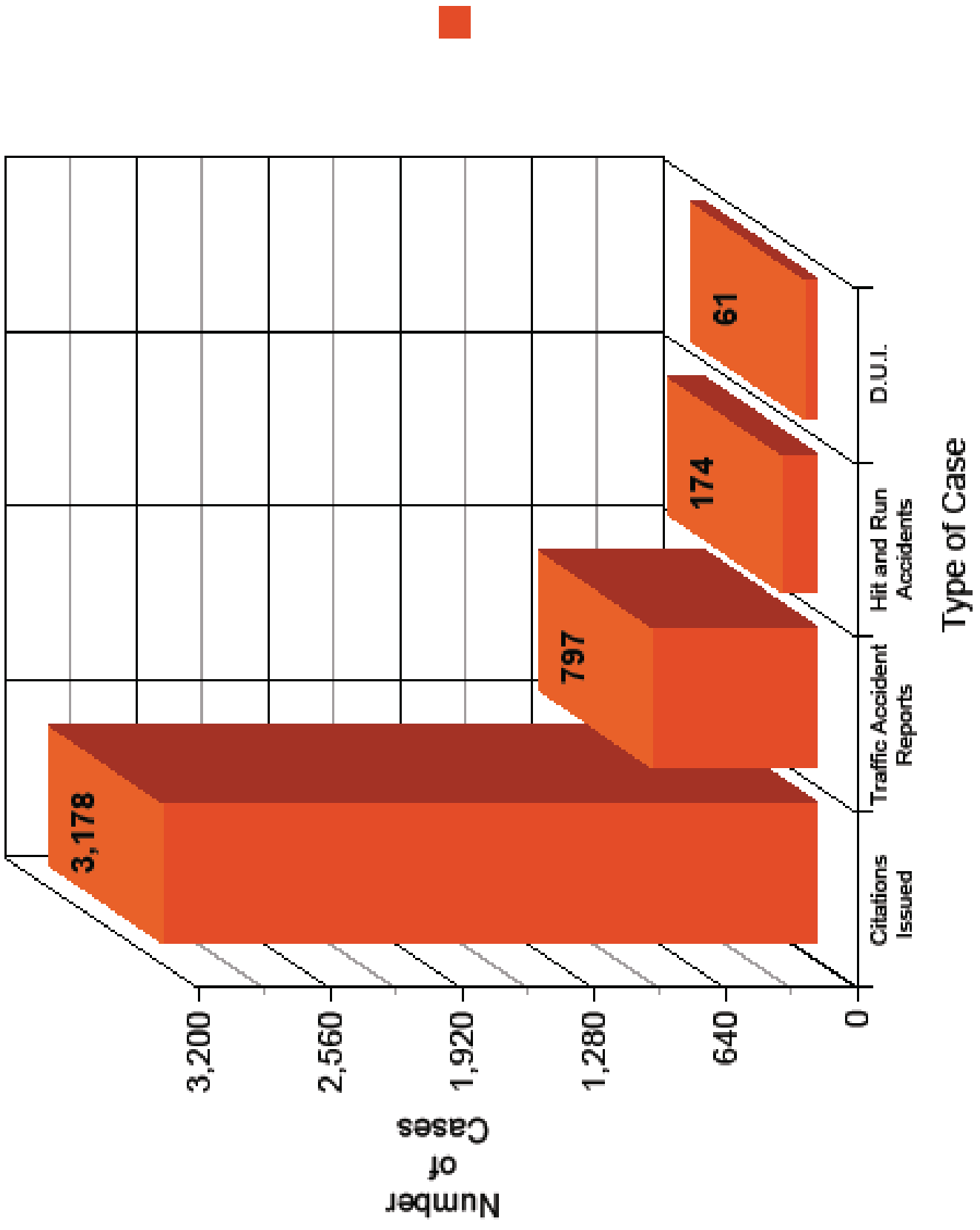

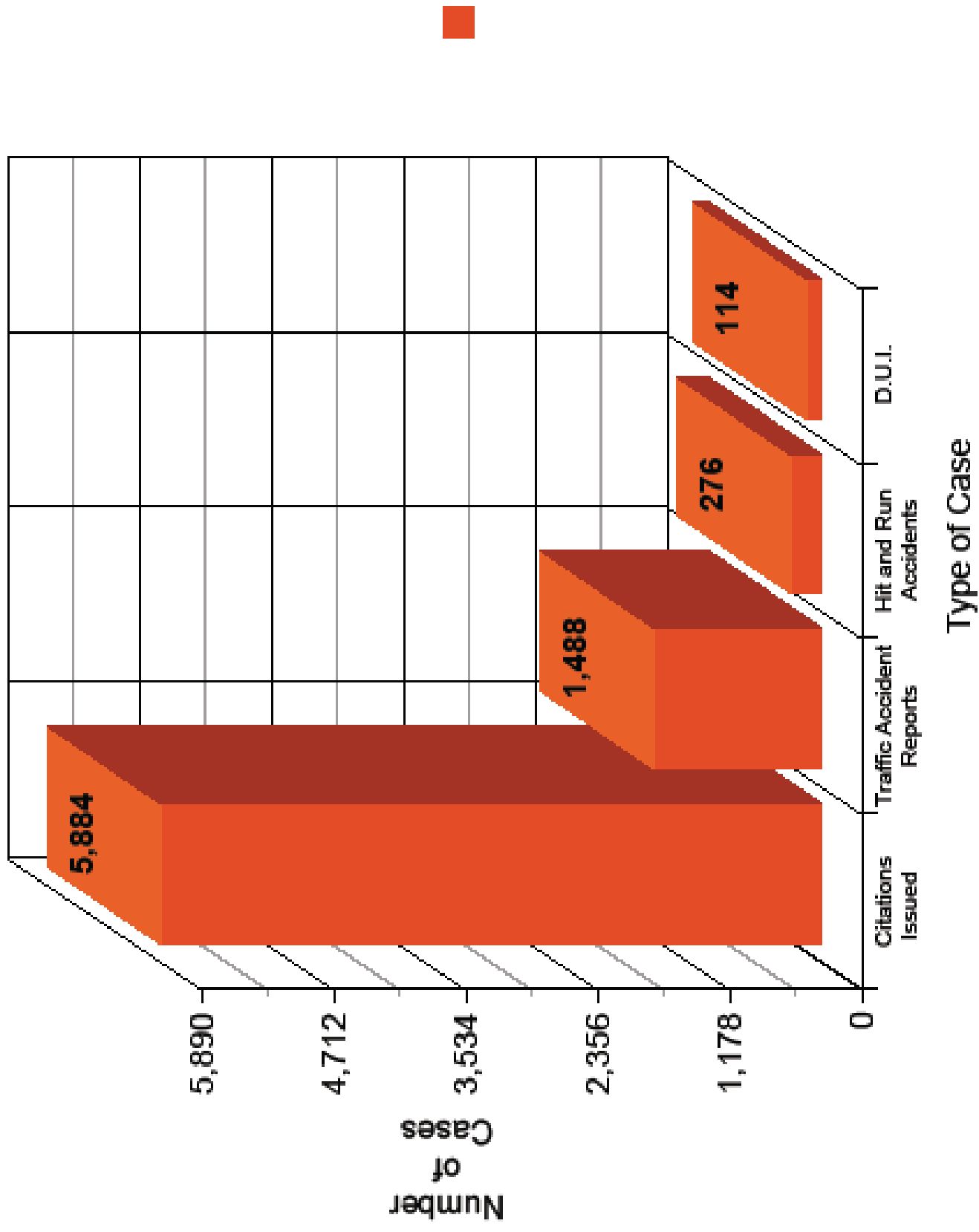
Millcreek (zone 7) First Quarter 2008

2008 Traffic Related Enforcement Action (YTD)



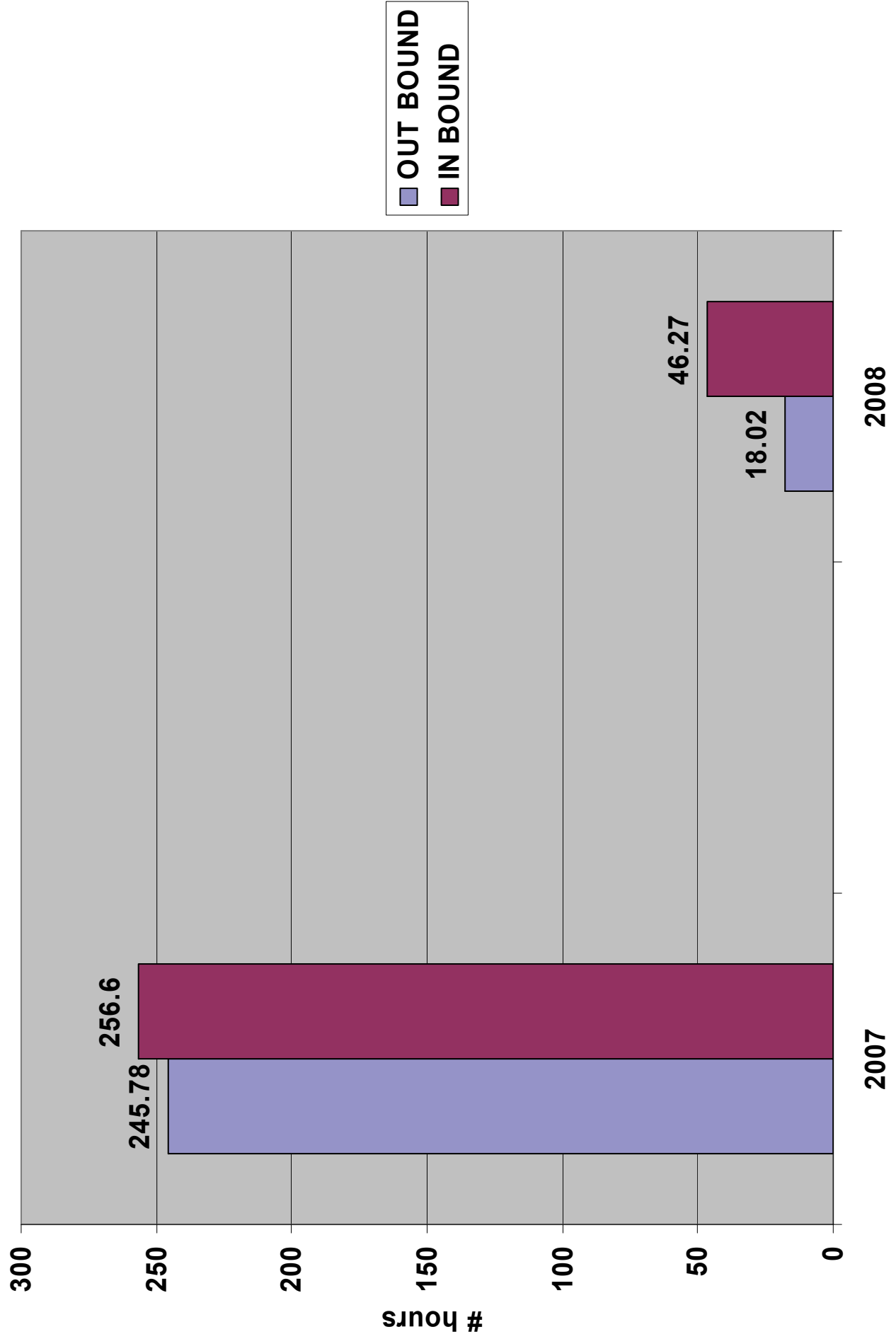
2007 Traffic Related Enforcement Action



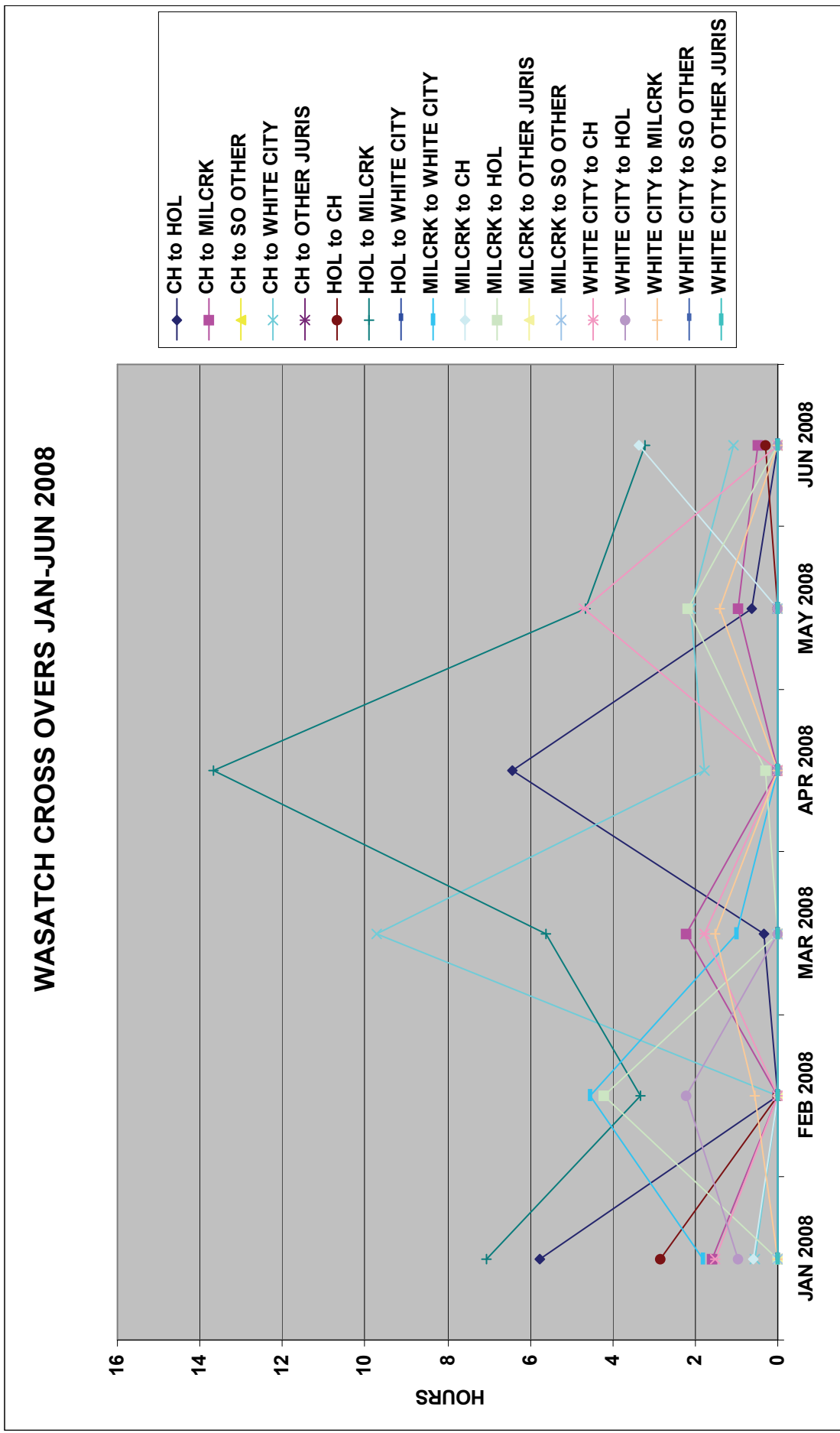

Investigations

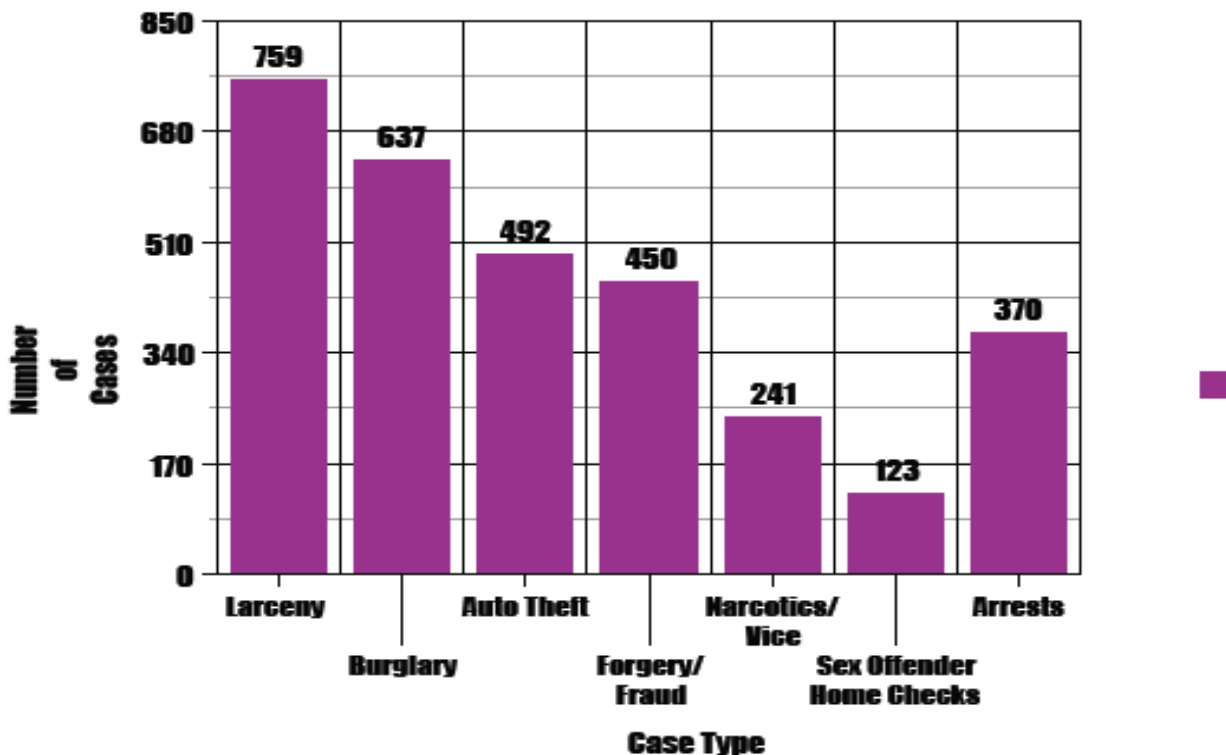
The Millcreek Street Crimes Unit is composed of 5 detectives, 2 Community Oriented Policing Officers, 1 School Resource Officer, and a sergeant. Four detectives primarily focus on property cases such as residential and business burglaries, larceny cases, stolen vehicles, and vehicle burglaries which require investigative follow up. The remaining detective specializes in forgery, fraud, and identity theft cases.

In addition to their respective caseloads, this unit investigates cases of narcotics trafficking, they conduct inspections of local bars and taverns, organize undercover prostitution and gambling operations, as well as assist neighboring agencies. The Millcreek Street Crimes Unit routinely assists other Sheriff Office divisions with large scale investigations, search warrants and sex offender compliance checks.

During the course of their duties, this group of detectives has demonstrated a commitment to building relationships with area business owners and residents, in an ongoing effort to reduce criminal activity.

In 2007 the Millcreek Street Crimes Unit was nominated for the “Unit of the Year Award” for their outstanding performance. During that year they completed 7699 follow ups.

Community Oriented Policing

Our main concept of Community Oriented Policing is “The Team”. This team involves Sheriff’s deputies and members of the community that we serve.

We are very pro-active with our C.O.P. philosophy by working closely with citizens, business owners, schools and a myriad of other individuals



and organizations. We work in conjunction with each other to obtain our goals and objectives in reducing crime and the fear of crime.

Wasatch District C.O.P. deputies provide, and get involved with, several programs for our citizens that help to create this teamwork atmosphere. These include Neighborhood Watch programs, The Business Coalition Program, “Officer Friendly” and other crime prevention and safety programs.

These committed members also work with zoning, code enforcement, adult parole and probation and a variety of other organizations.

Drugs and under age alcohol violations are among the top priorities with this unit. We actively enforce laws pertaining to these as well as provide programs and workshops for education and prevention. We maintain the EASY grant (Eliminating Alcohol Sales from Youth from the State of Utah and participate in “America Buckle Up” campaign. These programs are funded by the State and provide valuable resources to assist us with our goals.

The Millcreek Precinct C.O.P. developed the Citizen’s Police Academy for the Sheriff’s Office and is currently preparing its eleventh session with twenty-five participants. We are proud that the Sheriff has had extremely favorable comments and feedback from the participants in regards to this program and that he has expanded it office-wide.

Officer Friendly

The Officer Friendly Program is a volunteer secondary assignment for deputies. It is financed by private donations and is funded for the next two years. The program is designed to forge a positive relationship with elementary students and law enforcement officers. Our "Officer Friendly" deputies regularly attend school recesses, lunches, and assemblies.

Officer Friendly deputies give school presentations that are tailored to the needs of their student body. Lesson plans currently being utilized include how to deal with school bullies, proper texting and internet safety, Halloween safety, bike safety, gangs, at home alone safety, stranger danger and gun safety.

E.A.S.Y. Program

The Salt Lake County Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control, and the Department of Public Safety, are demonstrating their commitment to reducing underage alcohol use with the implementation of the **E**liminating **A**lcohol **S**ales to **Y**outh program.



This program is made possible by teaming Millcreek detectives with the youth in the community. Under the supervision of Millcreek detectives, underage operatives attempt to purchase alcohol products from retail stores in the Millcreek Township.

The Millcreek Township has 30 retail establishments which sell alcoholic beverages for “off-site consumption. In 2007, of those 30 establishments, nearly half (16) sold to our undercover operative. Through community education and this program, the number of businesses selling alcohol to minors has been reduced.

In 2008, deputies have conducted over 90 business checks. This has resulted in the arrest of 11 persons who sold alcoholic beverages to underage operatives. Nineteen of the 30 establishments refused to sell alcoholic beverages to minors.



School Resource Officer

Deputy Moses Fernandez

The Millcreek Precinct High School Resource Officer is responsible for providing our youth a safe and comfortable environment within the schools that he/she may be assigned. This officer works as a link between law enforcement and the school, school administration, teachers, parents, and most important, the students. The School Resource Officer has a tremendous opportunity to be a positive role model for the youth they come in contact with. This officer's job is situated on the school campus where most of his/her time is spent.

Deputy Moses Fernandez is stationed at Skyline High School. Each semester he teaches a Law Enforcement class on campus which averages an enrollment of 33 students.

Salt Lake County Sheriff's Office Citizen Police Academy

The Citizen's Police Academy (CPA) is a ten-week program designed to give participants a working knowledge of the Salt Lake County Sheriff's Office. It consists of a series of classroom discussions and hands-on scenarios. Training is held one evening a week. There are two academy classes each year and each class size is limited to approximately 25 students.

There is no cost to anyone who enrolls. The goal of the CPA is to create a better understanding, improve communication, and partnership with the citizens and the Salt Lake County Sheriff's Office through education. Community Oriented Policing plays an important role in reducing crime in any community. Therefore the Sheriff's Office instituted the CPA to improve communication and obtain input and support throughout the citizens they serve. It is our hope that graduates of the CPA become partners with us in identifying problems and solutions to the crime issues that are affecting our community.



What are Shared Services?

“Shared Services” are those law enforcement and support functions that by nature are most effectively and efficiently delivered in a centralized fashion.

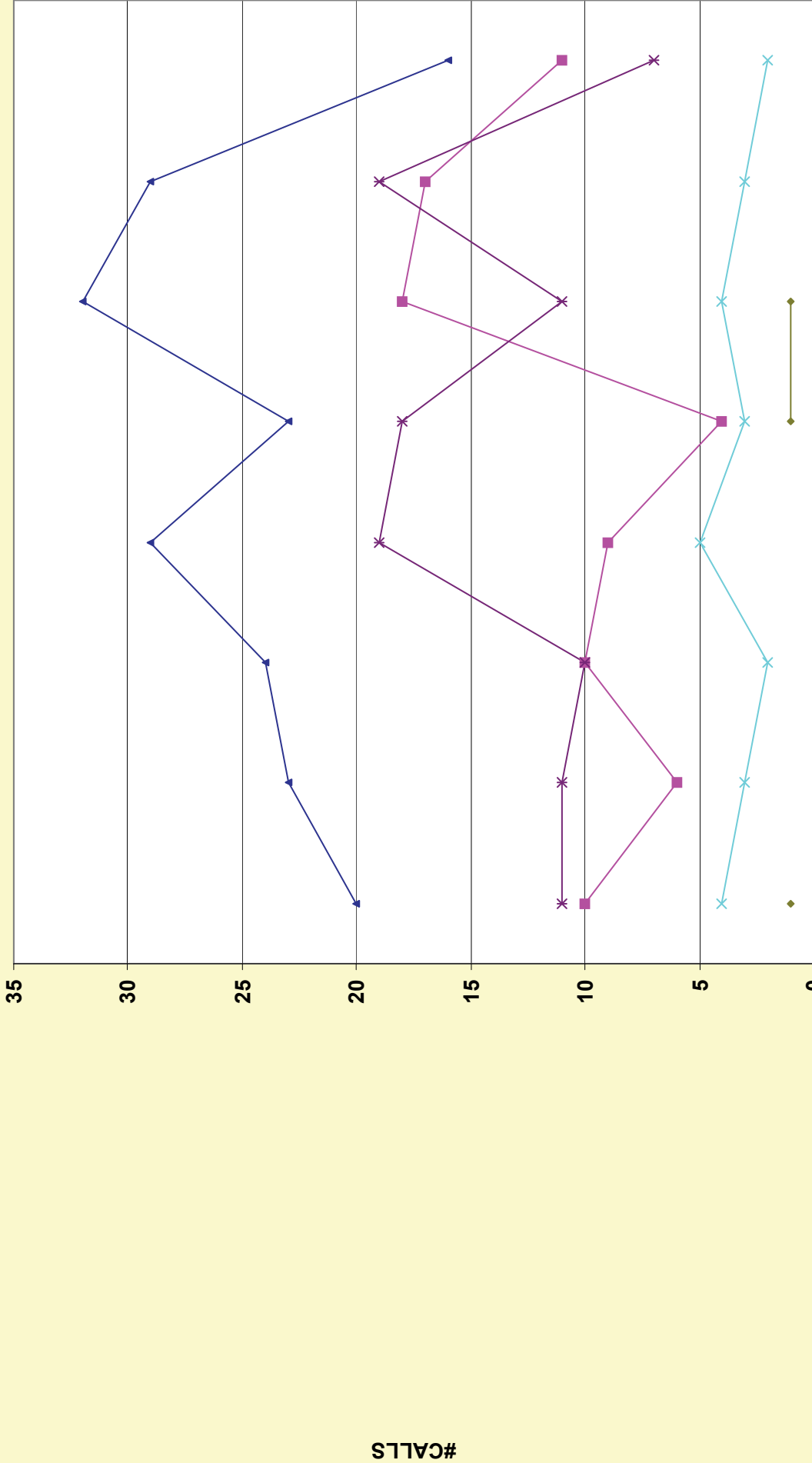

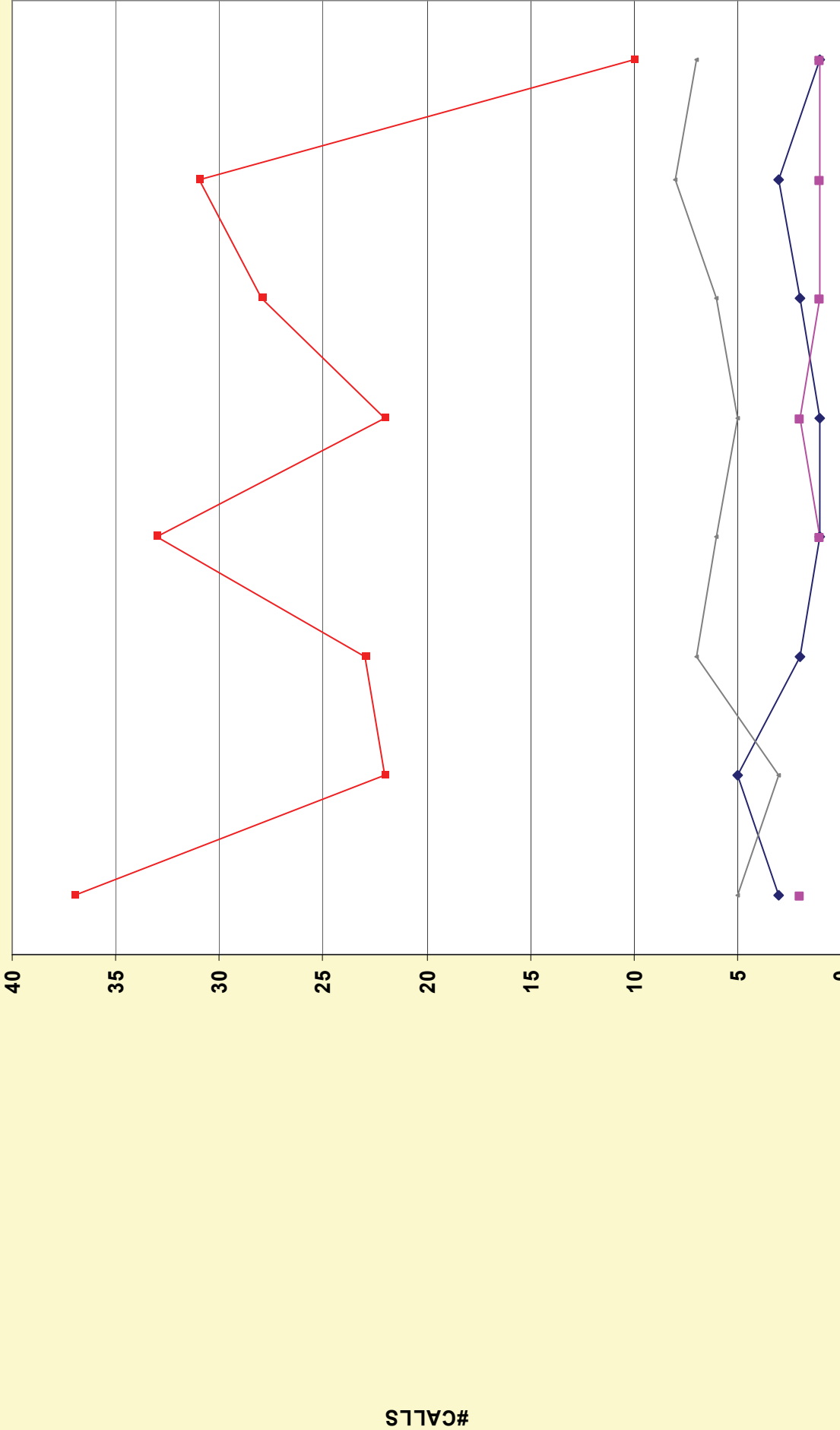

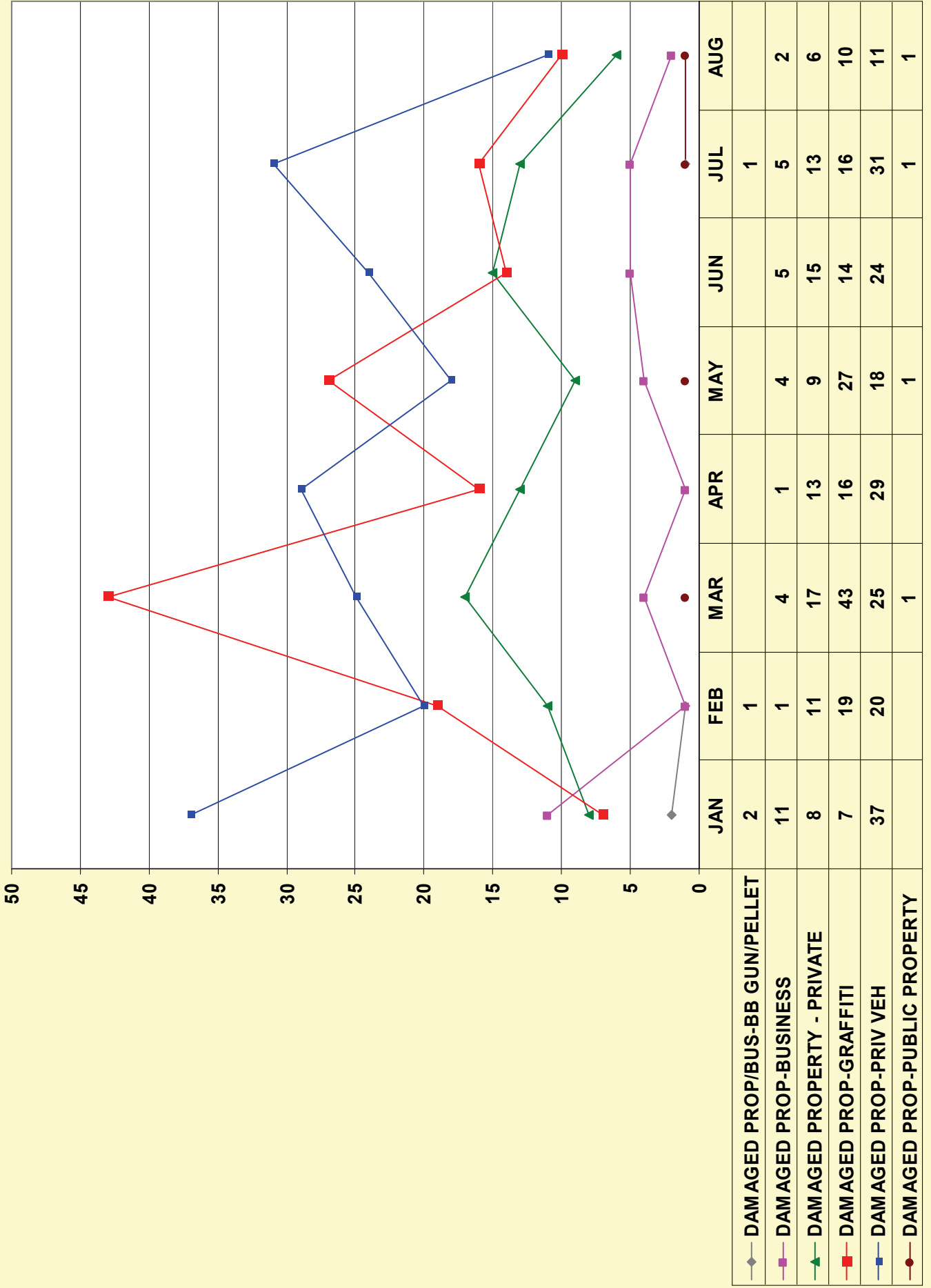

MILLCREEK TOWNSHIP MOST COMMON STOLEN VEHICLE CALLS 2008 YEAR-to-DATE



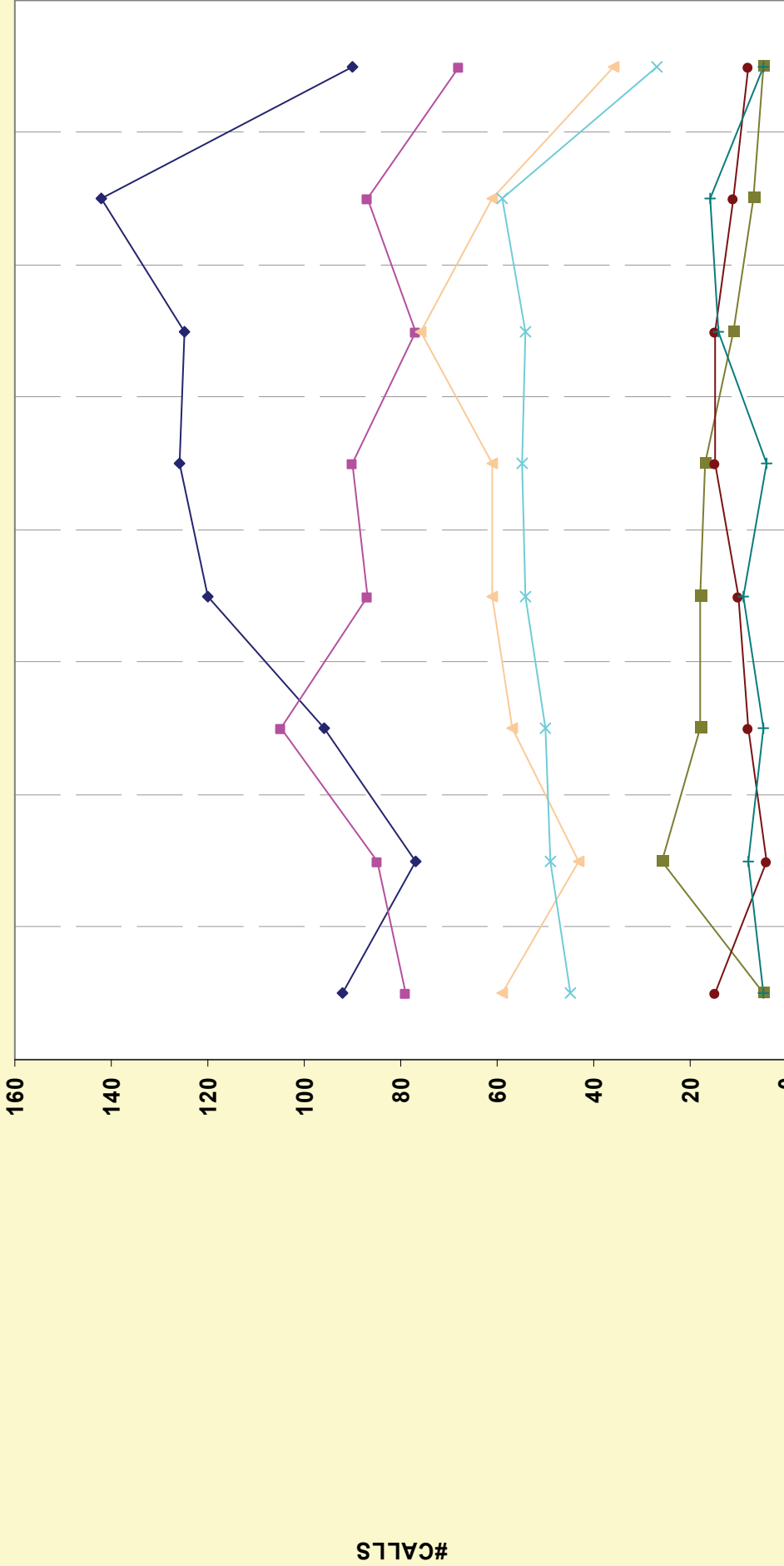
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MILLCREEK TOWNSHIP MOST COMMON VANDALISM CALLS 2008 YEAR-to-DATE

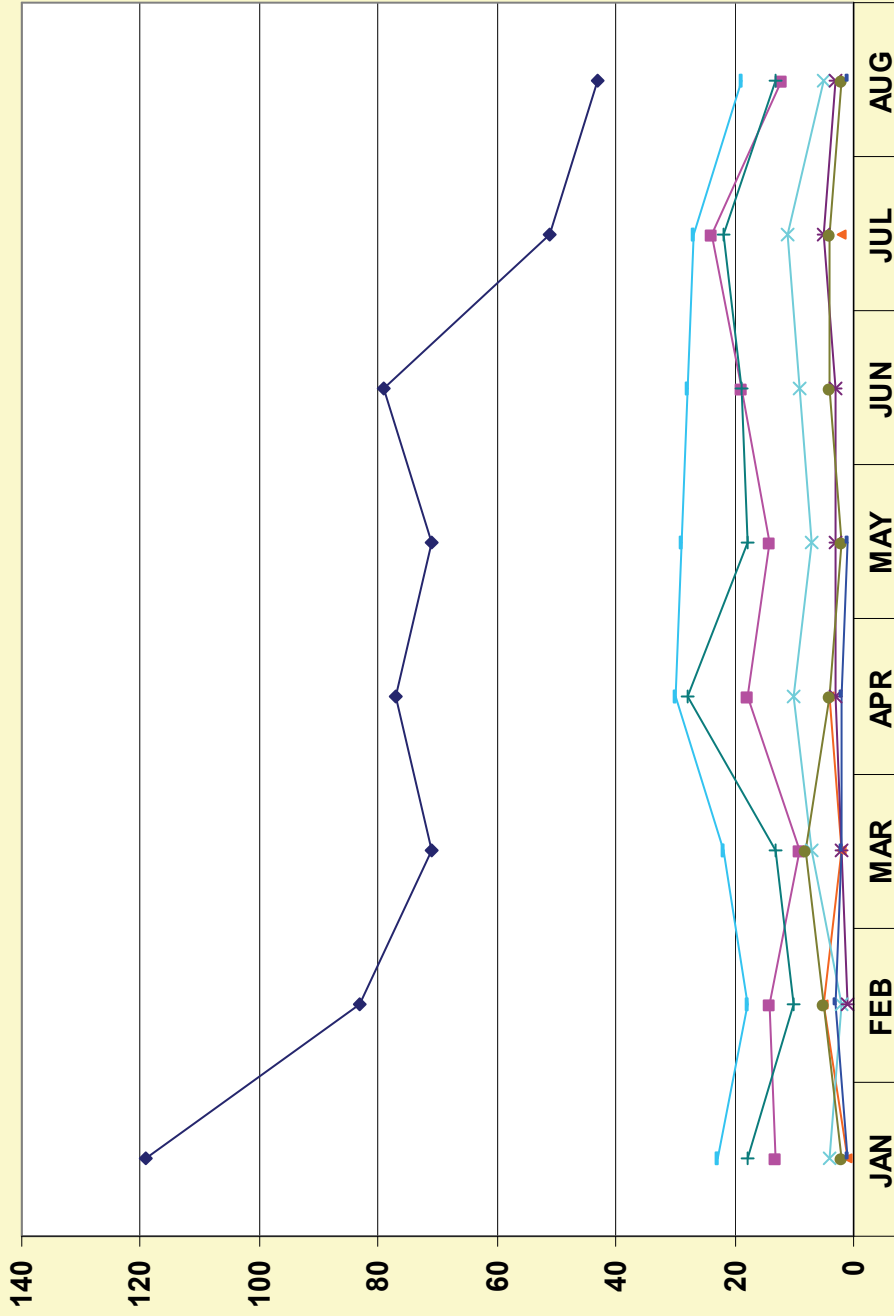
MILLCREEK TOWNSHIP - MOST COMMON PUBLIC ORDER CALLS 2008 YEAR-TO-DATE

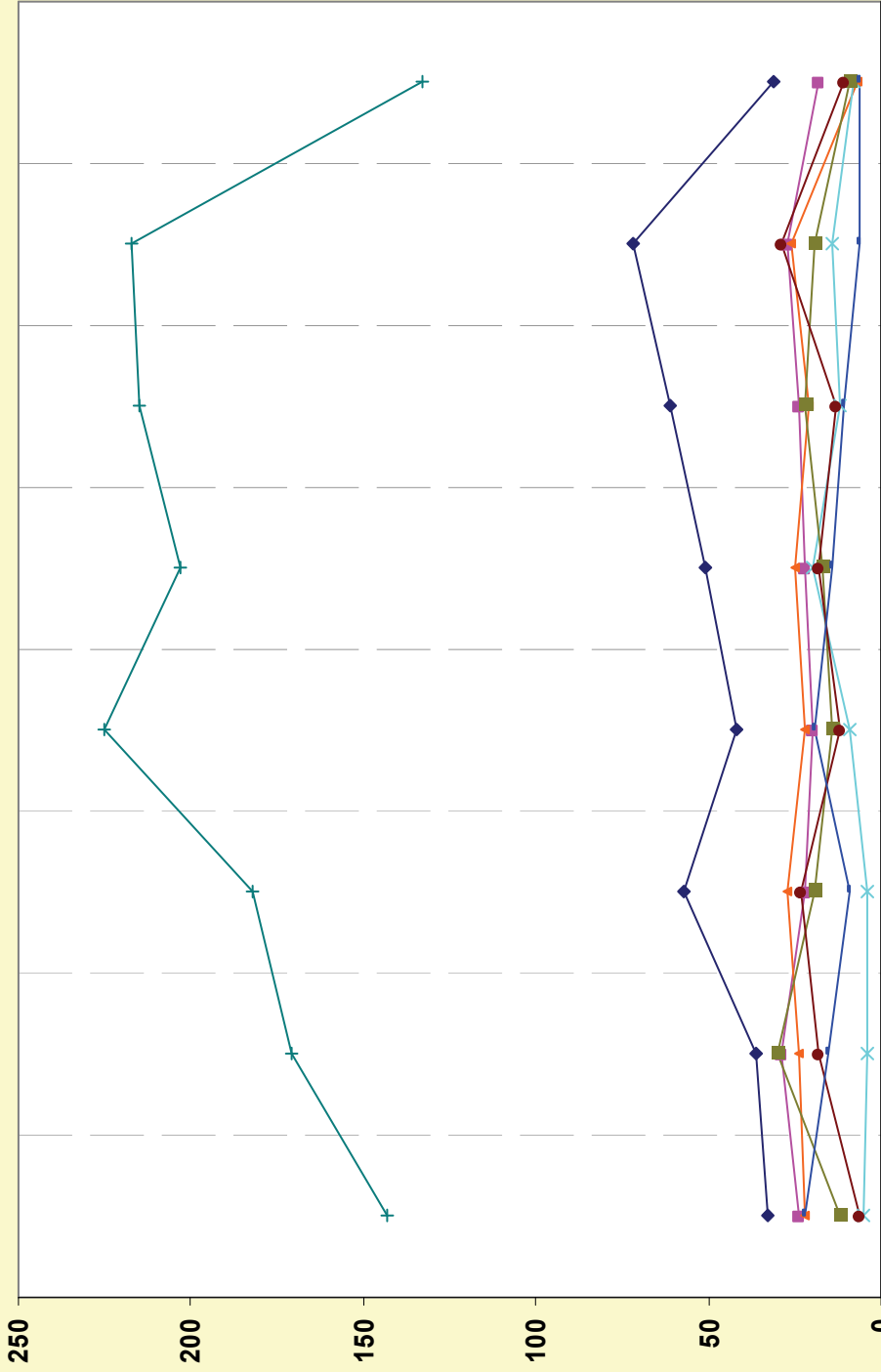

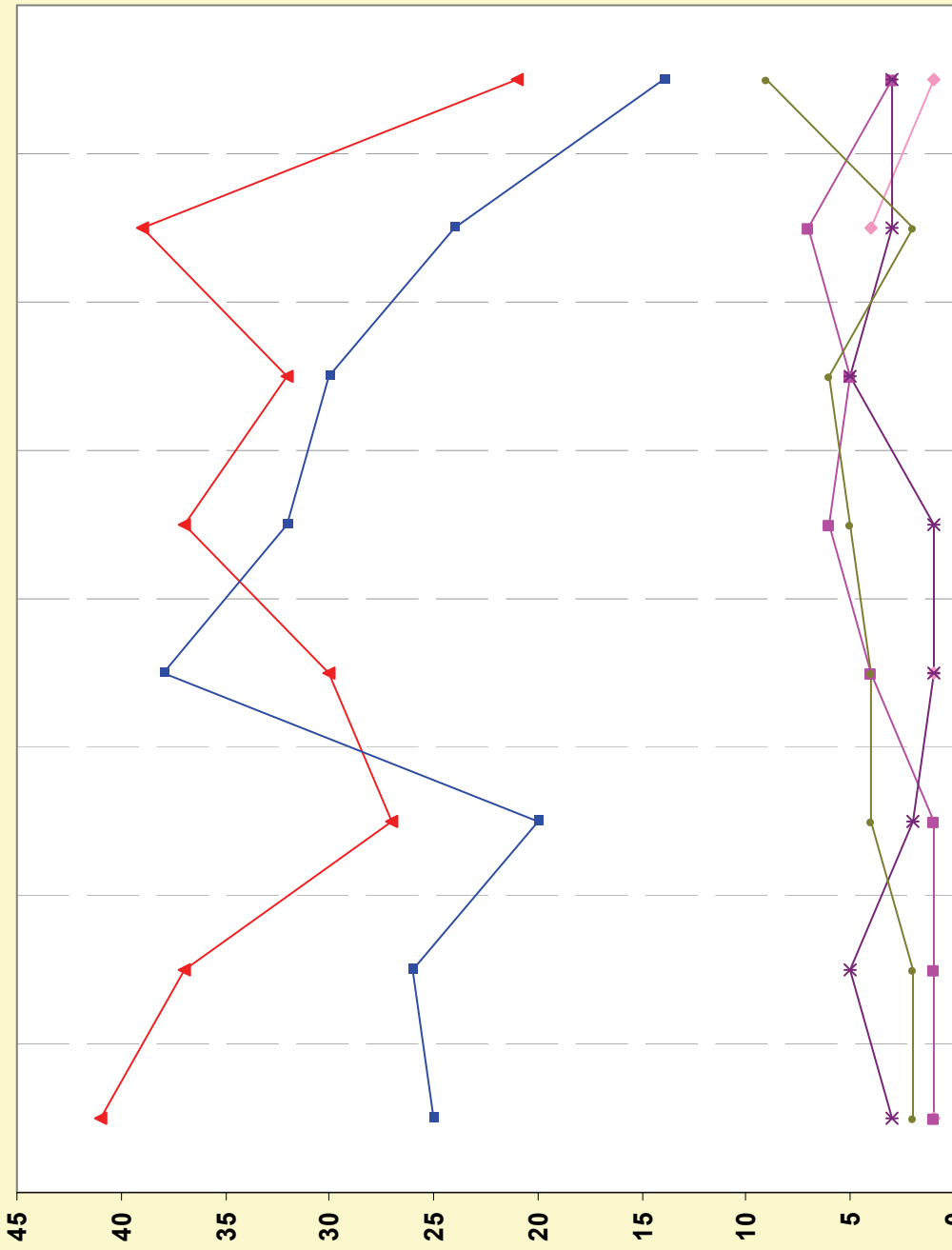

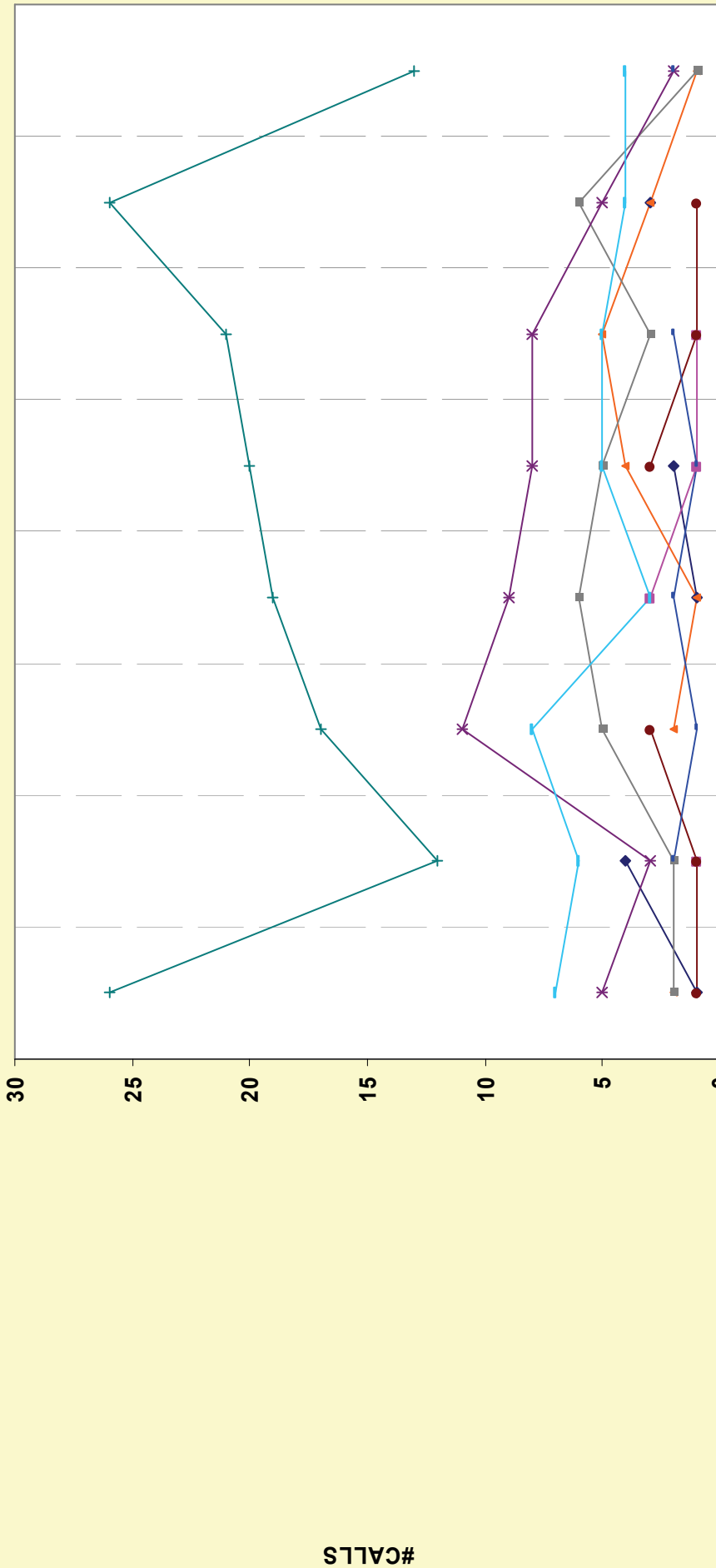
